Hello there Kauka:-

Good-morning Sir. The top of the morning to you Sir:-

I am enclosing to you 2 P. O. Money Orders, one for \$100.00, the other for \$1.58. I am also enclosing to you an account of the Receipts and Disbursements of the Estate since my Report to the Court, last June, In fact I am sending you the account as it was sent to me from the Lahaina Bank. This account nets \$63.51 for the whole Estate, I am sending you the whole amount, if the other heir claims half of this amount, later on, you can settle with her when she makes her claim.

The amount of \$38.40 is half of what I turned into Court, the other half is in the hands of the Court awaiting the appearance of the other heir. As I understood the matter, before you left, you fixed with Zoy, that Rose should have the homestead and that Zoy should have the other peice of land in Lahaina, but I cannot find any papers to that effect, Zoy did not turn up nor was she represented when the Court made the final Decree, nor do I know where she is .

The amount that I paid into Court, as well as this amount paid by the Bank, is from rent collected from tenants occupying the Homestead, and if you had an agreement with Zoy as to the division of the property, as above outlined, the whole amount should be paid to you.

This cleans up the Estate as far as I go, I think.

I have been asked by several people if you and Rose were returning to the Islands and to Wailuku, it seems to be generally understood that you both were returning, I know that you would like to return, under certain conditions, and so have informed those that have asked these questions.

The various candidates are getting ready for the County

Election that comes off on the 4th of May. All those that did not get a clean majority of the votes cast at the Primary, have to run again on the 4th of May. Five of the candidates that ran at the Primary were elected. The County Attorney, the Chairman and three members of the Board of Supervisors are yet to be elected, David Fleming, as a member of the Board, having been elected at the Primary.

I have been and are so busy, that I have not taken any particular interest in these elections, of late. They seem to do just as well and, perhaps, some better with<sup>out</sup> me, than with me.

Mother is well and as busy as always, she enjoys her home in Wailuku immensely. She has more chickens down there than you can count and still she is raising more.

Harry Baldwin is in Honolulu attending the Legislature, they will, or should be, thru before very long now. Frank Baldwin has gone to the Coast to see the Great Exposition, he will be gone for some weeks yet, however every thing goes on about the same as when they are both on the ground. Lufkin is on the Coast too to attend the Exposition as well as to attend the wedding of one of his neices who was down here, teaching school. Enos Vincent goes soon too, he will be out of his job on the 1st of July so I suppose he is going to go while he can draw a salary during his absence. I have not seen Case for a long time, he keeps pretty quiet since he lost the nomination at the Primary.

I saw Wadsworth last Saturday, when I was in Wailuku, he seems happy and prosperous and talked politics most of the time.

Howell still occupies your old house, in Wailuku, he has his Mother with him and expects his eldest daughter down from the Coast before long. He is again County Engineer and is the same old Howell, "always behind like an old cow's tail." Dr. Osmer is so busy that he has a young Dr. with him to help him out, I do not know whether they are in partnership or how it is fixed.

Goodbye, old man. Be good. Love to Rose and the kiddies.
